Sisters Honor Year for Priests with Prayer

The news that Pope Benedict XVI declared June 19, 2009—June 19, 2010 to be a Year for Priests fell upon jubilant ears within the halls of Saint Francis Convent.

Reverence for the priesthood has been an integral part of the Franciscan charism from the outset of the Order. This reverence was exemplified in St. Francis himself, who declared: "if I saw an angel and a priest, I would bow first to the priest and then to the angel."

On August 4, the official opening of the Year for Priests in the Diocese of Ft. Wayne/South Bend, many of the Sisters attended Mass and adoration at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Ft. Wayne, where a number of priests gathered to open the year.

During the celebration, Bishop John D'Arcy explained that the year is not for the glorification of priests but for their *sanctification*.

In addition to daily communal prayer for priests, the Sisters have opened the convent doors for members of the laity and clergy to participate in holy Mass, Liturgy of the Hours, and adoration every first Thursday of the month in the main chapel of the motherhouse.

Because the Sisters are indebted to the dedication of so many of the Church's clergy, they also established a petition book that rests on the altar of the Sacred Heart next to a vigil candle. Numerous names have been added to it as a daily reminder of the Sisters' commitment to pray for those priests who have gifted them with the sacraments or even those who were taught in our schools by the Sisters. As always, the convent doors are open to any priests wishing to spend some time in prayer.

As the year continues, the Sisters will intensify their prayer for the sanctification of these shepherds of the Church.

hen she was fifteen years old, Sister Estelle entered the convent with one thought in mind, namely, to offer up her whole life, especially all her suffering, for her father. When he helped people, he refused to accept money, so they gave him whiskey instead. Over the years, she had watched him become an alcoholic and wanted to give her life to the Lord for his recovery.

For years, Sister Estelle prayed and offered her sufferings with the desire that her father would one day stop drinking and be at peace with God. Sister Estelle's prayers before the Father on behalf of her father were heard. Her father stopped drinking three years before his death. Right before he died, he informed the barber that this haircut would be his last and sent all of his clothes to the cleaners. After going to confession and praying the rosary with his wife, he died in his sleep of an embolism.

After her father's death, Sister Estelle asked the Lord what she should do, as her whole purpose in entering the convent was to give her life for her father. That night she had a dream. She saw a large billboard with the words "Priests, Priests, Priests." This would become her vocation. "So from then on, besides my work, I prayed for priests," said Sister Estelle. When she came to live at the Motherhouse, she enjoyed having even more time to pray for priests. While she prayed for all priests, Sister met many over the years who requested her prayers, confident that the Lord would hear His bride. If Sister Estelle ever heard of a priest who was struggling, she prayed in a special way for his vocation.

Over the years, anyone who entered Sister Estelle's room would be greeted by a pictorial billboard of priests. Photos of priests and posters of seminarians adorned the walls of her room, reminding Sister of her constant intention.

She noted that in recent years more and more seminarians requested prayers,

and she was eager to pray for them as well. "Whatever the seminarian is, if he's good, holy, he'll

be the same when he's a priest," she explained. Daily, she came before her Spouse in adoration and offered Him her spiritual sons.

As her sufferings increased, so did her prayers on behalf of priests. She continued, "anything that hurts me, it's all for the priests." At her entrance into eternal life on April 7, 2010, Sister Estelle presented herself, in life as in death, before Jesus the High Priest, so that His Sacrifice might be perpetuated on the altars throughout the world.

Father Neary Pays Tribute to a Spiritual Mother

Sr. Estelle was my first grade teacher at St. Joseph Grade School in LaPorte, Indiana (1969-70). Even

then she was hard at work planting seeds for future vocations. Msgr. John C. Witte, our pastor, had a processional cross that was too long. When Msgr. Witte shortened it, Sr. Estelle asked for the piece he sawed off, as she had need of it.

On our birthdays, she would pretend to give us a swat with that piece of wood for each year of life, which weren't many at that stage, and the last extra swat was to become a priest or a nun. We thought it was great fun, but the verbal intention of the last mock swat must have registered with me on some deeper level.

I am aware that several of her first graders became priests and two of her nephews. The day of my ordination in April

of 1991, I was pleasantly surprised that she was able to attend, given her ill health at the time. When she

asked and received my blessing, she smiled broadly and said, "Do it again!"

I have been blessed all these years by her friendship and prayers. I know that I am a Holy Cross priest because of her example and that of the other Franciscan women religious who taught me at St. Joe's.

I have been blessed to be at Notre Dame these last 15 years, which has afforded me chances to visit regularly with Sr. Estelle. I attended her 50th jubilee celebration when I arrived on campus in 1994, and June 2009, attended her 75th jubilee.

I know that she prayed for me every day and I trust that her prayers have sustained me in my priesthood. We ended each visit by giving each other a blessing.

She never failed to remind me that there is power in these hands of mine. Her faith in the priesthood was deep, and so was her love for me all these many years. Only in heaven will I truly

understand what this special friendship has meant in my life! Fr. Patrick Neary, C.S.C.

"A mortal man, a creature, feeds himself, satiates himself, with his God, taking him for his daily bread, his drink... O miracle of miracles!... O love of loves!... O joy of joys!"

"When we go before the Blessed Sacrament, let us open our heart; our good

God will open His. We shall go to Him; He will come to us; the one to ask, the other to receive. It will be like a breath from one to the other."



"As long as I've been in the Community, nothing has attracted me more than adoration. I love it. I've taken it day and night on my own, not by appointment. I usually had 4:30 in the afternoon because that was a time when many Sisters couldn't take it. Also I had 12:30 a.m. -1:30 a.m. I've never regretted it. I loved adoration even before I entered the convent. The Lord gifted me with a love for prayer"


