our of our Sisters were blessed to join pilgrims from the Diocese of Fort Wayne-South Bend for World Youth Day in Panama. Their pilgrimage brought to life the World Youth Day theme, "I am the Servant of the Lord." Sister M. Lucia Richardson reflected that, "Mary, the image of the Church, said 'yes' to her vocation as Mother of the Christ. When we say 'yes' to God, we are united to Christ and His Church; we become family. At World Youth Day, you are surrounded by family – a family that has found joy and peace in their chosen-ness." The sense of intimacy also came alive to Sister Mary Grace Richey: "After experiencing World Youth Day, the one word that comes to mind is intimate: an intimate experience of the universality of the Catholic Church. I could not always converse with those right next to me, but, we were able to communicate the language of the Church: to praise and worship Jesus Christ." Sister M. Ignatia Henneberry compared the experience to attending World Youth Day in Cologne, Germany, as a teenager. "At WYD in Panama 14 years later, I was able to experience

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From the Desk of the Provincial

Dear Friends,

"I am the servant of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word" (Luke 1:38). The Blessed Virgin Mary is a model for all Christians. We are called to respond generously each time even when the call comes very unexpectedly. We recently bid farewell to three of our Sisters who died unexpectedly within a month. We are grateful for the lives and vocations of Sr. M. Rose Agnes Pfautsch, Sr. M. Raphael Kochert and Sr. M. Monica Bertha. We rejoice for them that they remained faithful to God's call to the end. But, oh, how we miss them! Each Sister was called to do a variety of apostolates within our Community and each one responded with generosity, fidelity, and perseverance. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.

We frequently talk about the fact that we never "retire" as Sisters. When our senior Sisters no longer engage in an apostolate such as teaching or healthcare, they continue serving as official adorers at the Motherhouse where our primary charism of perpetual Eucharistic Adoration is carried out. We are blessed in many ways with their presence among us. They teach us each day even though some of them have never taught in a classroom. We are blessed that our senior Sisters live on the same grounds as the youngest members of our Community. It amazes me to hear the young Sisters relate their conversations with our older Sisters. What a joy it is to see the strong bonds that develop between the generations. Our oldest Sisters have traveled the road, and they know what is important. They have made many sacrifices for us and we are eternally grateful.

I close with a quote from Pope Francis: "The Virgin Mary likewise shows us the way: the way of encounter between the young and the elderly. She set out to visit her elderly kinswoman, to stay with her, to help her, of course, but also and above all to learn from her — an elderly person — a wisdom of life. The wisdom of Elizabeth and Zechariah enriched her young spirit. They were experts in faith, experts in God, experts in the hope that comes from Him: and this is what the world needs in every age" (Pope Francis, Sept. 28, 2014).

DID YOU KNOW...

A Dream Come True.

Danny Thomas had a dream to build a shrine to St. Jude. He wanted this to be a hospital where children could be cared for regardless of race, creed, or ability to pay. This dream was realized when St. Jude Children's Research Hospital was opened in 1962. Danny consulted his good friend, Cardinal Stritch, regarding where to locate the hospital. A site was chosen in Memphis, TN across the street from St. Joseph Hospital, which was administered by our Sisters. Cardinal Stritch asked that our Sisters be the first administrators of St. Jude Hospital. Sister Mary Henrita Laake became the administrator, Sister M. Rita Schroeder was the business manager and Sister M. Doris Ann France was the Director of Nursing. Our Sisters served in these roles for the first eight years of the hospital's existence. In the early years all surgeries were performed at St. Joseph Hospital. The two hospitals were connected by a tunnel. St. Joseph Hospital also provided the power house and laundry for the new hospital.


Servants Of The Divine Physician: The Franciscan Leadership Enhancement Program

→ he Franciscan Leadership Enhancement Program (FLEP) began in 2011 as a means to help our coworkers develop and enhance their "ministerial" leadership skills by engaging in this two-year intensive study program. Participants are identified and recommended by the hospital Presidents/CEOs and include a diverse group of Sisters and physician and departmental leaders from all our healthcare facilities, and representatives from the University of Saint Francis. The program focuses on the Catholic Church, St. Francis, Blessed Maria Theresia Bonzel and the history of the Sisters of St. Francis of Perpetual Adoration, Catholic Social Teaching, Prayer, Canon Law, and the Ethical and Religious Directives for Catholic Health Care Services.

The first year classes are held at the Motherhouse. It provides the opportunity for the Sisters to meet some of our coworkers. Participants are provided an in-depth insight into the lives of the Sisters and true Franciscan hospitality. We are grateful for the leadership of Kevin Leahy and Sister Jane Marie Klein for providing this program for our coworkers.

Sister M. Rose Agnes Pfautsch: I am privileged to share the spirit of our beloved foundress with our coworkers in our various apostolates through the Franciscan Leadership Enhancement Program (FLEP).
