Dear Friends,

Mother Maria Theresia wrote in a letter to her Sisters in America in March of 1882 the following, "Be zealous, dear Sisters, in keeping the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Among all our apostolates, it is the highest and the first. Insofar as we are faithful or unfaithful to it, so will our other works be." In March of 2020, when our normal way of life began to change dramatically as a result of the pandemic, our primary charism of perpetual adoration became even more central to our lives as Sisters of St. Francis of Perpetual Adoration. We began to receive hundreds of prayer requests daily. Many requests were for the health and safety of loved ones, but a significant number were prayers in gratitude for healthcare workers throughout the world. We are so proud of our coworkers at Franciscan Health, who are working on the front lines daily to 'continue Christ's healing ministry' in each of our hospitals. And our Sisters in the education apostolate have heroically transitioned to online learning. But what a sacrifice it is to teach to a computer screen or to walk through the campus of the University of Saint Francis in the middle of the day with no students in sight. It's not supposed to be this way. And all those serving in administration are faced with planning for an unknown future. As Mother Maria Theresia firmly believed, we trust in God's providence. He has the plan. We believe that good will come from this time of uncertainty. And we believe in the love God has for each one of us. Jesus came as a healer. He brought compassion and mercy to all those he encountered. We don't have to look far to see those who are following Jesus in their life of service to others, even if only from within their own homes. Each one of us is called to be heroic, whatever our circumstances may be, through our loving and compassionate service.

On behalf of the Sisters of St. Francis of Perpetual Adoration, we assure you of our continuous prayers for you and your loved ones during our hours of Eucharistic Adoration throughout the day and night. It is our 'highest and first apostolate' and our greatest privilege.


